StoryCorps invites you to add your stories and the stories of those you love to the over 10,000 interviews we've recorded to date. **Through this invitation, your StoryCorps interview is free of charge.**

StoryCorps will help you to interview your grandmother, your uncle, your co-worker or your oldest friend— anyone whose story you want to hear and preserve. StoryCorps has two soundproof recording booths in New York City, located in Grand Central Terminal and the WTC PATH Station. The interview process takes about an hour. You leave with a broadcast quality CD of your interview and, with your permission, another copy of your interview will become part of the StoryCorps archive at the American Folklife Center at the Library of Congress.

StoryCorps is modeled—in spirit and in scope—after the Works Progress Administration (WPA) of the 1930s, through which oral-history interviews were recorded across the country. These recordings remain the single most important collection of American voices gathered to date. StoryCorps hopes to build and expand on that work, becoming a WPA for the 21st Century.
